### 5. Lu Rees Archives: promoting reading in Chinese and offering student internships

The Lu Rees Archives (LRA) at the University of Canberra is an impressive resource for information about, and access to, translations of Australian children's literature. The archive has about 3,200 in translations in 53 languages. Books held by the Archives are available for study and research by the general public and can be read during opening hours.

With the support of an ACT Government Multicultural Grant, the archives are working with local Chinese community language schools to select and purchase Australian children's books which have been translated into Chinese. Once catalogued, annotated and listed on the schools' and the Archives' websites, these books will be available for loan to children and their families, thus becoming a shared family experience.

The LRA also provides part-time internships for students which can last up to a semester. Based on their time commitment, students are given projects which might include updating and creating research files and finding aids.
