3. Public Seminar: Hindi Express - Phones, tablets and notebooks in class

Presenter: Dr Peter Friedlander, College of Asia & the Pacific, ANU

How do we deal with era in which students are constantly on their phone, tablet or computer? Seeking to take advantage of this situation, a new online/on-campus course for first year Hindi began to be developed last year (see: <u>http://www.bodhgayanews.net/topic000.html</u>).

This presentation looks at issues involved in conceptualizing and creating language teaching materials in an era of constant online access. It will also outline possible directions for research to investigate the impact of online materials on issues such as vocabulary acquisition, teaching time and retention rates.

Dr Friedlander will argue that there are substantial advantages to using online materials and current developments in multi-lingual support on PC/Mac/Android platforms allow for the creation of materials which are widely accessible by students. However, there are also many challenges, in particular, tensions over resourcing development and conflicts between spending time creating online materials and spending time conducting research towards publication goals.

In the end though, the question is not whether students will be accessing materials through phones, tablets and computers but how language teaching can adapt to an era in which, even in class, students are constantly online.
