5. ENHANCING THE LEARNING OF MANDARIN AND PROMOTING UNDER-STANDING OF CHINESE CULTURE THROUGH EDUCATION IN THE ACT

A working group (WG) chaired by the ACT Education and Training Directorate (ETD) was established in June 2014 to explore ways of promoting Mandarin. Members of the WG include representatives from all school systems (ACT government, Catholic and independent), as well as the Australian National University, University of Canberra, ACT Chinese Teachers Network, Association for Learning Mandarin in Australia, and Community Languages Schools. The terms of reference of the WG are:

- To prepare a two-year blueprint for enhancing the learning of Mandarin and promoting understanding of Chinese culture in ACT schools.
- To identify and optimise the resources available for languages.
- To identify and optimise the opportunities in the new Australian Curriculum.
- All participants of the working group have equal responsibility for achievement of the role and aims of the working group.

The ETD has collected information from WG members to build a picture of current activities, the priorities of WG members and ideas for building on current initiatives. This data was discussed at a WG meeting on 17 September 2014. Based on the data collected and discussion at the September meeting, the ETD will develop a draft blueprint for further discussion by the WG in 2015.
