Language Teaching Methodology course at the University of Canberra (UC)

The Spanish Speakers Association Inc has partnered with UC, which is offering its Language Teaching Methodology course to community language teachers in the ACT.

Running from 31 May until 16 July, the course examines and reflects upon contemporary approaches to language teaching across all ages and levels and identifies teaching practices and principles for teaching speaking, listening, reading writing in a foreign language. Requiring a commitment of approximately 100 hours, the course includes online activities for independent learning, engagement and reflection, and one weekly evening session at UC.

- WA education has plans to develop resources for Noongar language teaching
- If successful, Noongar could be offered alongside European and Asian languages, eventually studied all the way to year 12

8. The role of family languages in mainstream education

Schools overseas are increasingly adopting classroom practices which encourage students to compare and contrast languages – both those taught at school and those brought to school by the children themselves. This approach has been shown to improve language learning and to have general educational, socio-cultural and economic benefits. Acknowledging the value of all languages has also led to more active encouragement and support for the use and development of family languages in mainstream schools.

How does this relate to the ACT?

With of 20% of ACT residents speaking a language other than English at home, a significant proportion of children enrolling in our mainstream schools have some knowledge of an additional language. The majority of our schools recognise the importance of home languages. They may name them on notice boards and posters, mention them during Harmony Day events and refer parents to community language schools. Parents of children receiving EALD support are also advised, particularly by specialist EALD teachers, to continue speaking their family language at home and to read to and with children in that language.

However, given the proven educational and socio-cultural benefits for all, could ACT schools do more to actively encourage the learning, development and sharing of skills in all of the languages represented in our school communities? This is one of the areas to be addressed in the 2021 Work Plan of the Canberra Languages Network.
