1. Canberra is becoming more multilingual

According to ABS census data for 2021, the percentage of people in the ACT speaking a language other than English at home (either exclusively, or in addition to English) was 24.6% of the population in 2021. This is an increase over 2016.

The top 20 languages spoken, in order are:

The largest changes between 2016 and 2021 were:

- Nepali (+4,993 persons)
- Punjabi (+2,804 persons)
- Mandarin (+1,989 persons)
- Urdu (+1,269 persons)

2. ACT Language Education Action Plan 2022-2025

Nearly four years after the ACT Legislative Assembly passed a motion to 'develop an action plan to encourage, improve and support language education in Canberra Schools as a part of implementing the Future of Education Strategy', the ACT Education Directorate has released a *Draft ACT Language Education Action Plan 2022-2025* and a *Discussion Paper: Languages Education in ACT Public Schools* to assist the consultation process. 3. Increased support for ACT Community Language Schools

Excellent news to hear that the ACT government committed an additional \$513,000 over four years in the 2022-23 ACT Budget to support ACT community language schools. According to Minister for Multicultural Affairs, Tara Cheyne, when she presented the [ACT Government response to the resolution on language challenges facing Canberra's Multicultural community](#) in August 2022, this amount will be added to the current 4-year budget allocation of \$777,259.

Minister Cheyne went on to say that a total of \$312,875 will be available in 2022-23 for

- the delivery of a community language school grant,
- to commence planning for a Teacher Professional Development Program and
- to fund the establishment of a New School and Teaching Resources Development Fund.

The ACT Government response also noted that the Community Services Directorate (CSD) is working with the ACT Community Language Schools Association, the Education Directorate, Canberra Institute of Technology (CIT) and Libraries ACT to identify alternative funding models, ongoing access to venues and professional development support for community language schoolteachers.
