1. VIDEO COMPETITION: SHARING LANGUAGES AND CULTURES

Free and open to all students from preschool to Year 12 in the Canberra Region

To enter, students produce a video of a conversation (maximum length 2 minutes) involving a language other than English. The conversation could be with an older member of the family, a classmate or a friend, and the language can be a family or community language or a language being learned at school.

- Three categories: Preschool-Year 2, Years 3-6, and Years 7-12
- First prize of \$100 for each category, plus 6 runner-up prizes of \$50

Open day

The ACTCLS Association held a very successful Open Day at the Albert Hall on Saturday 15 May 2021. Opened by the ACT Minister for Multicultural Affairs, the day featured fantastic performances by students, interesting displays and activities - and some tasty snacks - on the many information stalls, and an excellent round table discussion in the afternoon.

Independent review

There is still no news on when the Independent Review of Investment in ACT Community Language Schools commissioned by the ACT government will be released and/or tabled in the Assembly. The review was completed at the end of 2020 and submitted to the Community Services Directorate before Christmas.

University of Canberra short course on Language Teaching Methodology

Supported by a community grant obtained through the Spanish Speakers Association and Director Mr Carlos Torres, twenty teachers from ACT community language schools are currently enrolled in a Language Teaching Methodology short course at the University of Canberra (UC).

The course is being offered in a mixed-blended mode, with classes timed to suit the teachers and full-time working participants. A graduation and awards night is planned for mid to end of August. Teachers who successfully complete the course can apply for entry into the Graduate Certificate and Graduate Diploma in Foreign Language Teaching.

Changes in administration from 2021

Established in 2015 by the ARC Centre of Excellence for the Dynamics of Language (CoEDL), the Patji-Dawes Award will be administered from 2021 by the AFMLTA and the Languages and Cultures Network for Australian Universities (LCNAU), co-sponsors of the Award since its inception.

4. REFORMS TO THE ADULT MIGRANT ENGLISH PROGRAM (AMEP)

Significant changes are afoot in the Australian Government's Adult Migrant English Program (AMEP), a free service that has been supporting migrant settlement since the 1940s. Already announced are the removal of some limits to participation. Eligible migrants and humanitarian entrants in Australia can now:

- keep studying, even if they have completed 510 hours (the previous limit), until they reach a level of vocational English (previously the limit was 'functional' English)
- apply to enrol, even if they have enrolled in the AMEP before and have been living in Australia for many years

The Department of Home Affairs has now released a discussion paper about further changes to the AMEP and is calling for community feedback - from individuals, groups and organisations with an interest or expertise in the AMEP
